Let's Get Cleaned-Up with Indiana Brownfield Grants

The environmental remediation at Lee Alan Bryant (LAB) has wrapped up! The Redevelopment Commission accepted bids in January 2021 to sell the property so now we can make plans to get the property back into private hands for development. We look forward to seeing all the changes The Sanitorium LLC has in store for that property.

The Parke County Museum and Historical Society are also experiencing the benefit of the Indiana Brownfield program this year. A two-phase environmental assessment has been completed with plans to remediate an underground storage tank and soil testing in late September 2021.

The Town of Rockville received grants for an environmental assessment and orphan tank investigation at the former Jacks and Jacks building. Rockville is making plans for the best use scenario of that property to benefit the downtown area.

Start with a Plan

We want to recognize Rose-Hulman Institute of Technology for their partnership in helping us make plans for development projects. Parke County submitted a proposal for the 2020-2021 school year for an Industrial Site Development Plan. Our proposal was selected as one of the senior projects. We now have an in-depth study on planning for an industrial area in southern Parke County.

Recently, two new projects submitted by Rockville and Montezuma are being considered for a Freshman Capstone Project. Announcement of the selected proposals will be made in March 2022. Both are planning for community development projects.

Rose-Hulman offers these partnerships at little to no cost for municipality planning. You have an opportunity to participate in the development of skills for the students. In addition, the municipality has a chance to plan before taking on the expense of a firm to implement the project.

COVID-19 Recovery Grants

Last October we announced the receipt of a \$250,000 grant from the Office of Community and Rural Affairs (OCRA) for Business Recovery. We successfully executed that grant and helped 15 local businesses retain their employees.

Parke County was awarded two additional OCRA grants. First, in partnership with Child and Adult Resources (CARS), we were awarded \$200,000 to assist with technology barriers as part of the Community Connections for People with Disabilities Grant. CARS was able to create a technology lending library and create some fabulous online programs for their Parke County clients.

This spring the County received its most recent award of **\$250,000**. This award was in partnership with the newly formed Parke County Food Security Alliance. The Alliance is a collective group of organizations across the County that provide assistance to those that are food insecure. The grant also allows us to purchase hygiene products in addition to food items. Check out the **Live Well Parke County** Facebook page.

We greatly appreciate the participation of the Parke County Community Foundation in providing matching funds for the Business Recovery and Food Alliance programs.
